Reservation Information

- ◆ Reservations are accepted up to 11 months in advance of the check-in date.
- ◆ Any reservation requested less than three (3) days in advance of arrival can only be made through the respective park's office.
- ◆ Some operations will require reservations through the park's office regardless of the length of notice (i.e. Group Camps, Primitive Camping, etc.)

Cancellations

- ◆ Cancellations/changes are subject to fees based on the amount of advance notice.
- ◆ Cancellation is required unless changes are requested at least 15 days in advance of the arrival date for lodging or at least four (4) days in advance of the arrival date for camping or day-use facilities.
- ◆ Early departures are subject to the cancellation policies.
- ◆ All transaction fees are non-refundable.

Lodging at South Carolina State Parks ranges from resort-type villas along Lake Jocassee and lodge rooms near Strom Thurmond Lake, to historic CCC cabins at beachfront parks and protected natural areas. They are all fully furnished and come with heating and air conditioning. Linens, and basic cooking and eating utensils are provided. (Hickory Knob lodge rooms do not include cooking and eating utensils.)

Check-in/Check-out Time for Lodging

Check-in time is 4 p.m. (3 p.m. at Hickory Knob)
Check-out time is 10 a.m. (11 a.m. at Hickory Knob)

Deposit for Lodging

50% of the total rental fee is required for most lodging.

Length of Stay for Lodging

- ◆ Rentals are typically accepted for a minimum of two (2) nights, however during busier periods, some parks rent by the week only.
- ◆ The weekly rental requirement most often applies from the Friday before Memorial Day through Labor Day, but is in effect during longer periods at some state parks.
- ◆ When the weekly rental requirement is in effect, the length of stay is limited to seven (7) consecutive nights.

Pets

Pets are not allowed in or around lodging facilities.

CAMPING

There are numerous camping opportunities available at various state parks. Each type of camping presents a unique setting in which to experience the parks' resources, as well as differing levels of amenities.

Family Camping: Traditional campgrounds provide sites for camping trailers, RVs and tents. Most parks have a limited number of pull-through sites and other sites that will accommodate larger units. These areas include access to restroom/hot shower facilities, water and electric hook-ups, a picnic table and holding tank dumping stations. Some parks also offer rustic tent sites (centralized water and no electricity) at a reduced rate.

Backcountry Camping: These sites are typically located in remote areas of the park, with access requiring some degree of hiking or boating.

Primitive Camping:

Organized group camping areas are restricted to organized groups. (An organized group is defined as "a group that holds regular meetings and has a lead officer or elected/appointed officials".) The purpose of these areas is to allow groups to experience parks in a setting that lends itself to resource education and the development of an environmental ethic.

Equestrian camping areas are accessible to water and are located at or near the equestrian trail head.

Check-in/Check-out for Camping

Check-in is 2 p.m. Check-out time is 12 noon.

Length of Stay

◆ Maximum length-of-stay on a particular site during periods of high demand is 14 nights. Longer stays are allowed during periods of less demand.

◆ Camping parties may not register for more than 42 nights of any 49 consecutive night period. At parks along the Savannah River and its lakes no more than 28 nights out of 60 consecutive night period.

General Camping Policy

In addition to these policies please refer to the rules and regulations included in this publication.

◆ All camping parties must be registered. Sites rented on a first-come, first-serve basis must be occupied each night of the registered period.

◆ A campsite is considered occupied when at least one member of the party at least 18 years of age is present on the site with the camping equipment, or camping equipment is in place and the party is engaged in opportunities provided at or near the park.

◆ Campers are allowed a maximum of one trailer/RV and one tent OR two tents per site. No more than six (6) persons (or one family) may occupy the same site.

◆ Some designated tent sites are limited to one tent.

◆ Only licensed vehicles may be operated in a state park and must remain in areas specifically intended for vehicular traffic. Golf carts must display a valid permit at all times.

- ❑ Reservations can be made up to 11 months in advance of your check-in. For example: If you would like to check in on September 20, 2006 call the toll free number or go online October 20, 2005.
- ❑ Reservations within three days or less of arrival must be made through the park. For example: If you would like to check in on December 9, 2005 and the date you are making the reservation is December 6, 2005, you must make the reservation by contacting the park.
- ❑ Reservations for group camps and primitive camping must still be made through the state park.
- ❑ Rates do not include applicable taxes and transaction fees
- ❑ Discounted rates are available at all parks for seasons of lower demand.

Prices, hours of operation and availability of facilities are subject to change. Check with the park before making final trip plans.

TRAILS

- ◆ **Interpretive Trails** vary in length and provide some type of interpretation such as signs or brochures.
- ◆ **Hiking Trails** vary in length and degree of difficulty. Trail registration is required at Caesars Head, Jones Gap, Table Rock, Oconee and Keowee-Toxaway.
- ◆ **Bike Trails** vary in length and difficulty. All bike users are required to stay on designated trails
- ◆ **Trailside Camping** is available at Keowee-Toxaway, Caesars Head and Jones Gap. For reservations call 1-866-345-PARK.

FISHING

- ◆ Fishing is free of charge, except from the Myrtle Beach pier.
- ◆ Most parks have either reservoir lake, park lake (lake located entirely within state park boundaries), river or ocean fishing.
- ◆ A South Carolina fishing license is required for freshwater fishing for everyone 16 years of age and older.
- ◆ Park fishing lakes may have been restocked recently. Some may be closed for restocking. Check with park for current fishing status.

BOAT RENTALS

Personal flotation devices are required with all rental boats. Some parks rent boats only by the hour, day or half day.
Pedal Boats - \$3/30 minutes
Canoes/Kayaks \$3/30 minutes; \$5/hour; \$7/half day; \$12-15/day
Fishing Boats \$12/day; \$2.50/hour

BOAT ACCESS

The use of privately-owned boats and gas-motors are prohibited on all park lakes located entirely within state park boundaries, unless approved by permit at select parks.

Boat Ramps: Launching is free at all parks except Edisto Beach.
Rental Slips: Available at Calhoun Falls on a yearly basis and Dreher Island on a nightly or yearly basis.
 Most parks along rivers provide a boat drop off area for private boats.

EQUESTRIAN FACILITIES

- ◆ Equestrian facilities may include show rings, equestrian campgrounds, trails and stables.
- ◆ Equestrian beach access is available at Myrtle Beach and Hunting Island December, January and February. Permit required. Horses are allowed only in designated areas.

RETAIL FACILITIES

Park Stores/Tackle Shops/Gift Shops:

Food, camping supplies, film, ice, novelties, soft drinks, snacks and gift items are for sale. In addition to these items, the tackle shops also sell fishing tackle, supplies, bait and fishing licenses. Some facilities are open only during the busy season. Hours may vary.

HISTORIC RESOURCES

- ◆ A property listed on the National Register is recognized by the federal government as a valuable resource with historical and/or archaeological significance.
- ◆ Property designated as CCC was developed by the 1930's New Deal Program, Civilian Conservation Corps.

DAY-USE FACILITIES

Picnic area and picnic shelters:

- ◆ Picnic areas have tables and nearby restroom facilities. Many have grills and playground equipment.
- ◆ Picnic shelters may be reserved for a fee or, when available used without charge on a first-come, first-served basis. Exception is at Caesars Head and Baker Creek, where reservations are not accepted.
- ◆ Picnic shelter reservation fees: Large shelter \$30-38/day; Small shelter \$25-32/day; two picnic areas at Charles Towne Landing with shelters are \$50-157/day/area; shelters at Keowee-Toxaway are \$20-25/day.

Swimming: Most designated swimming areas are open depending on availability of lifeguards. Before making plans check with the park for operational schedule. Lake swimming - \$1.50/youth or adult (age 12 and older); \$1/child 6-11. Exception is Calhoun Falls where a designated swim-at-your-own-risk area is available free of charge.

Tennis: No charge

Carpet Golf: \$1.50/person
Bike Rentals: \$3/person; \$3 deposit
Skeet at Hickory Knob is by reservation only \$10-15/round

INTERPRETIVE SERVICES

The interpretive services listed in this publication focus on established tours and or programs provided by park staff on a regular basis. At some parks additional tours are provided by a tour service such as wildlife education tours or canoe and kayak programs. Contact the parks for information on services provided by local vendors.

Programs and Guided Tours

Colonial Dorchester - Observe an archaeological excavation, times vary. Historic Tours of the Dorchester village available upon request.
Edisto Beach - Coastal ecology educational programs held March through November.

Hampton Plantation - Historic house museum tours, interpreting colonial architecture and rice plantation life, are held Thursday through Monday from 1 to 3 p.m. on the hour. From Memorial Day to Labor Day, Thursday through Monday, tours are held on the hour from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. House tour admission: \$4/adult; \$3/child.

Hunting Island - Barrier Island educational programs & tours of the historic lighthouse complex are held March through November.

Huntington Beach - Coastal Exploration programs held from March through November.

Myrtle Beach - Coastal appreciation programs held during the summer months from Tuesdays through Saturdays. Other natural history programs held throughout the remaining year.

Oconee Station - The historic Richards house and Oconee Station are open for self guided tours with ranger assistance on Saturdays and Sundays from 1 to 5 p.m. and by appointment .

Redcliffe Plantation - Historic house museum tours focus on plantation life, architecture and family history. Tours held on the hour Thursday through Monday from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. House tour admission: \$4/adult; \$3/child.

Rose Hill Plantation - Historic house museum tours focus on plantation life from 1828 to 1960. Tours held Thursday through Monday on the half hour from 1 to 3:30 p.m. House tour admission: \$4/adult; \$3/child.

Interpretive Centers

Museums are exhibit halls with interactive elements intended to interpret the natural or cultural resource at the park.

Education Centers are settings for interpretive programs and field study. They come with equipped laboratories and classrooms, and often also have exhibits.

Nature Centers are also staging grounds for interpretive programs. They do have aquariums, tanks and displays that showcase the kinds of animals found at the park.

Annual Pass

Park Passports are available for \$50 and are ideal for frequent park visitors. The Passport provides unlimited entry to state parks for the occupants of the displaying vehicle. Passports are valid for one year after purchase. Passports may be purchased at any state park or the Central Office. Multi-passenger vehicles that seat 16 or more are not eligible for park passports.

The Palmetto Passport is a privilege offered to senior citizen, blind and disabled residents of South Carolina at half the cost of the regular State Park Passport.



The South Carolina State Park Service invites you to participate in a variety of opportunities offered throughout the state. State park properties are divided into classification groups which will help visitors know what type of opportunities and experiences they will have at a particular park or site.

- ◆ **Special resource parks** feature natural and cultural resources of such exceptional caliber they warrant special protection. These sites provide limited facilities and focus on protecting the natural resources and preserving the historical features.
- ◆ **Regional parks** provide opportunities for recreation in a natural setting as well as facilities to serve the neighboring community or region. Each site has a significant attribute which contributes to the quality of life for that region.
- ◆ **Outdoor recreation parks** are capable of supporting more intense recreation opportunities. While the resources of these areas are not as fragile as those of special resource and traditional parks, development of facilities is designed to complement the natural landscape.
- ◆ **Traditional state parks** contain significant natural and cultural resources much like special resource parks, but also provide traditional recreation opportunities for visitors without compromising the integrity of the resource.

Park Office Hours

All parks have office hours between 11 a.m. – noon. Several parks have additional hours between 4 p.m. – 5 p.m. Offices at the busier parks are open 9 a.m. – 5 p.m. Weekend office hours vary.

Pets

Pets must be on a leash or other physical restraint at all times. Owners will be asked to remove noisy or dangerous pets or pets that threaten or harass wildlife. Pets are not allowed in or around lodging facilities.

Senior Citizens, Blind & Disabled

- South Carolina resident seniors who are at least 65 years of age, legally blind or disabled, qualify for certain rate reductions. Proof of age or disability is required.
- ◆ Rate reductions apply to admission fees, Palmetto Passport, camping, picnic shelters, and certain recreational activities.
 - ◆ These same rate reductions are extended to out-of-state U.S. residents *only at*: Baker Creek Calhoun Falls Hamilton Branch Hickory Knob Lake Hartwell Sadlers Creek
 - ◆ There are **no** rate reductions for lodging, building or meeting facility rentals, leased facilities, resale items or equipment rentals.

Accessible Facilities: ♿ Designates parks with limited overnight lodging accommodations for the physically impaired. Campsites designated for disabled persons are available at all state park family campgrounds.

There are some areas that may be potentially hazardous. All visitors should exercise caution when visiting any state park. Anyone who is unsure about possible hazards should contact a Park Ranger.

Rules and Regulations

The following rules and regulations are provided to ensure that your visit is pleasant and enjoyable. These policies are maintained in consideration of our guests and to protect the resources within South Carolina's state parks. Please be sure that all members of your party are aware of these conditions prior to arrival. While this abridged listing does not include all regulations pertaining to activities in state parks, it does address some of the more common questions and concerns.

Unlawful Acts In State Parks include (but are not limited to) the following:

- ◆ Destroying, defacing, disturbing or removing any part of any building, sign, structure or equipment.
- ◆ Destroying, cutting, breaking, removing, defacing, mutilating, injuring, taking or gathering any tree, shrub, other plant or plant part, rock, mineral, or geological feature except by permit issued by the Department.
- ◆ Dumping any refuse or waste, including grey water, from any trailer or other vehicle except in places or receptacles provided for such use.
- ◆ Possession of firearms is prohibited except by certified park rangers and other authorized personnel.
- ◆ Operating vehicles in a reckless manner, or in excess of posted speed limits, or in areas other than those specifically intended for vehicular traffic.
- ◆ Consuming or displaying in public any beverage of alcoholic content, including beer and wine, except where specifically authorized by the Department.
- ◆ Acting in a disorderly manner or creating any noise which would result in annoyance to others.
- ◆ Engaging in or soliciting business within a park or facility except where authorized by the Department and no person shall distribute, post, place or erect any bills, notices, paper or advertising device or matter of any kind without consent of the Department.
- ◆ Bringing a dog or any other animal into the park or facility unless it is crated, caged or upon a leash not longer than six feet or otherwise under physically restrictive control at all times.
- ◆ Entering a facility or area without regard to restrictions on public use.

Unlawful acts in state parks are defined in Title 51, Chapter 3, Section 145 of the 1976 Code of Laws of South Carolina. Any person violating the provisions of this section of the law shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be subject to a fine or imprisonment.
